When will the schools open again? How are the schools going to open up again? Are you going to have class this year? Those are the questions on every parent's mind these days. TODAY Parents have collected the latest information from all states and the largest school districts in all states. While some schools are planning to start the new school year with face-to-face instruction, many others are offering online options or a hybrid model. Please note: We will continue updating this story, but the situation is changing rapidly, so please check with your local school district for the latest news. Meanwhile, here's what we know about the reopening of schools this year: on June 26, State Superintendent Eric Mackey announced that all Alabama public schools should reopen on time. However, districts have the final say, and schools should provide remote learning opportunities for students who cannot return to school. Jefferson County Schools: Students can choose to participate in face-to-face instruction, remote learning, or virtual learning, which is another form of online instruction that is taught by an outside provider. If a health order that determines 50% of capacity is deployed, a combined model that combines face-to-face and remote learning is implemented. Baldwin County Public Schools: Students can choose to resume face-to-face instruction or virtual learning on August 12. Mobile County Public School System: MCPSS will announce its plans for the 2020-2021 school year in mid-July. The Department of Health and Social Services and the Department of Education and Child Development have put together a framework called Alaska Smart Start 2020 to guide the reopening of schools across the state. The framework provides actionable steps for schools operating in low-risk, medium-risk, and high-risk environments. Anchorage School District: Students can choose between ASD at school and TEA at home. Asd at school will be a traditional face-to-face instruction, and ASD at Home offers students the option to learn through full-time virtual instruction or home education. Matanuska-Susitna Borough School District: MSBSD has prepared a plan for online learning at home, learning at school and a combined model. The mixed model will take effect if there is a slight outbreak in the area, so half of the student body will be on campus for a week and at home for the next week. Fairbanks North Star Borough School District: Because Alaska is currently in the low- and medium-risk categories, students can return to face-to-face instruction or choose virtual learning. If the situation gets worse, all students will switch to learning. Virtual Gov. Doug Ducey postponed the reopening of the education until at least August 17 due to an increase in covid-19 cases across the state. Schools may choose to start online instruction early, but no classroom class can begin before the beginning of August. August Unified School District: Remote learning will begin on August 4 until it is safe to resume face-to-face instruction. Tucson Unified School District: Online instruction will begin on August 10, but students who wish to learn in person will be able to make the transition when it is safe. Peoria Unified School District: Virtual instruction will begin on August 5, and the first three days will be half days to help students adapt to the learning environment completely online. The district plans to eventually return to face-to-face instruction, but there is no set date yet. Gov. Asa Hutchinson has repeatedly said that face-to-face instruction should be resumed in the fall, but schools need to be ready with a virtual curriculum as well. Little Rock School District: Students can choose to participate in person or online for the 2020-2021 school year. An updated plan will be announced on July 13. Springfield School District: Students have the options to attend school in person or online. Bentonville Public Schools: Face-to-face instruction will resume, but students and teachers must be prepared to switch to online if they get sick. Full-time virtual learning is also an option for students for the fall semester. At a July 8 press conference, Governor Gavin Newsom said local health and education authorities will make final decisions about the 2020-2021 school year. Los Angeles Unified School District: No plans were announced for the 2020-2021 school year. San Diego Unified School District: Students will resume classes on August 31 and can choose to attend school in person, online, or a combination of both. Long Beach Unified School District: The class will begin on September 1, and students will be able to choose between face-to-face instruction and at least one other digital learning option. According to the Colorado Department of Education website, the most likely scenarios for schools during the 2020-2021 school year include a mix of remote and face-to-face learning. Denver Public Schools: Face-to-face instruction is scheduled to resume on August 17, but students can also choose to participate in a completely virtual learning. Jefferson County Public Schools: Students can choose to resume face-to-face learning or remote learning. Cherry Creek School District: Students can resume face-to-face learning or continue learning online. The district also has a post-COVID-19 model, which means that all normal school systems would be resumed. On June 25, Governor Ned Lamont announced that schools in all districts will be able to resume classroom instruction New Haven Public Schools: Students will have the option to resume face-to-face instruction or online instruction for the fall of 2020. Bridgeport Public Schools: Students will resume face-to-face instruction in the fall. Hartford Public Schools: Students have the option to resume face-to-face instruction in the fall, but are being asked to do research to help the district make more decisions. Gov. John Carney said at a July 7 press conference that Delaware's goal is to allow as much as instruction as possible in a way that is safe. Education Secretary Susan Bunting is reviewing a number of recommendations, so no official plans have been released. Red Clay Consolidated School District: No plans have been announced for the next school year, but the district is asking students and families to do a survey by July 13 to help them plan. Christina School District: There were no official announcements about the 2020-2021 school year. Appoquinimik School District: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Richard Corcoran, Florida's education commissioner, signed an executive order on July 6 requiring all schools to open and provide the full range of services that are required by law. The order says that remote instruction can happen as long as it allows interaction with students' classmates and teachers. Miami-Dade County Public Schools: The district has postponed the start of the school to August 31, and all students will begin the year following a full-time remote model. Broward County Public Schools: On July 14, Superintendent Robert Runcie recommended that schools not reopen for face-to-face learning. He said schools should pursue full-time virtual learning because it is the only way to educate our students by keeping them and their teachers healthy and safe. Hillsborough County Public Schools: Students will resume classes on August 24, and instruction will be completely virtual for at least the first four weeks of class. The Georgia State Board of Education has released guidelines encouraging districts to use remote instruction, face-to-face learning, or a combination of both. Gwinnett County Public Schools: Students are scheduled to start classes on August 12 and can choose between face-to-face or virtual instruction. Cobb County Schools: The beginning of the school year has been postponed until August 17, and students can choose between virtual and face-to-face instruction. DeKalb County School District: No official plans were released for the 2020-2021 school year. Hawaii State Department of Education: Classes will resume on August 4, and students can receive face-to-face instruction, online or through a model. Gov. Brad Little and the Idaho State Board of Education and the State Department of Education released a back-to-school structure on July 9. The structure says students are likely to return to face-to-face instruction in the fall, but schools are also encouraged to prepare virtual and hybrid learning models. West Ada School District: Students can choose between face-to-face and virtual instruction. Boise Independent School District: No plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Nampa School District: Students can choose between face-to-face or online instruction. On June 23, Governor J.B. Pritzker announced plan to resume face-to-face instruction for the next school year. Schools will be required to force face masks, limit meetings to fewer than 50 people, maintain social increase cleaning efforts and perform symptom tests and temperature checks. Chicago Public Schools: On August 5, Chicago officials announced that students will follow a full-time remote learning model until at least November 6. The district will continue its meal distribution program and provide devices for students who need them. Eligible families can also sign up for free high-speed internet access through the Chicago Connected program. At a press conference with Chicago Public Schools Executive Director Janice Jackson, Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot said the decision stemmed from the contribution of families and public health guidance. U-46 School District: Students will start the school year on August 24 through the district's Distance Learning Program. Rockford Public Schools: Students can choose between face-to-face and virtual instruction for the first semester of the 2020-2021 school year. Plans for the second half will be announced later. At a July 8 press conference, Governor Eric Holcomb said authorities in Indiana will examine factors such as the number of covid-19 admissions and positive cases, as well as the state's testing capability and contact tracking capability when determining whether to open schools. Fort Wayne Community Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Indianapolis Public Schools : No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Evansville Vanderburgh School Corporation: Students will resume face-to-face instruction on August 5, but students in need of quarantine and those with health problems will be able to follow the instructions online. On June 25, education officials in Iowa released guidelines that allow schools to resume normal activities on July 1. No social leave, masks and routine health check-ups are required. Des Moines Independent Community School District: Students can choose to participate in an online-exclusively online instruction model from August 26 to October 28, or they can start the year using a hybrid model of face-to-face and online instruction. Cedar Rapids Community School District: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but are expected to be released in late July or early August. Davenport Community School District: The school year will begin on August 24, but no official plan has been announced on how it will be. Wichita Unified School District: The final plan for the 2020-2021 school year will be released on July 20, but a preliminary plan announced June 30 detailed the district's intention to resume face-to-face instruction. Parents will also have the option to enroll students in online learning. Public Schools: Students will resume classes in the or August 14, and parents can choose to enroll them in virtual or face-to-face instruction. Shawnee Mission School District: No final plans were announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but elaborated plans for elementary, middle and high school students has been released. In the three drafts, students will have face-to-face or online learning options. The Kentucky Department of Education has published a number of considerations for schools as they draw up their plans to reopen. This includes guidance on transportation, facilities and logistics, security, and alternative learning design strategies. The department recommends the creation of plans for remote learning, in addition to face-to-face instruction. Jefferson County Public Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but are expected to be released in mid-July. Fayette County Public Schools: Students are expected to resume face-to-face instruction during the week of August 24, but the district launched a survey on July 1 to get more feedback from families. Boone County Schools: Students are expected to return to a face-to-face model of instruction at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year, but should also be prepared to participate in a virtual or hybrid model if deemed necessary. On June 25, the Louisiana Department of Education released a series of guidelines and resources to help schools reopen for the 2020-2021 school year. The department recommends that schools prepare themselves in face-to-face, virtual, and hybrid learning scenarios. Jefferson Parish Public Schools: Students are expected to resume classes in person on August 6, but teachers are also prepared for the possibility of using hybrid and virtual models. East Baton Rouge Parish Public Schools: Students will begin school virtually on August 6 with the option to resume face-to-face instruction through a hybrid model on September 9, or begin with the hybrid model from the start. The hybrid model means that children would receive face-to-face instructions two days a week and virtual instructions three days a week. Caddo Parish Public Schools: Caddo Parish schools have three possible plans to reopen. Students may be taking classes virtually, in person, or as a combination of both, but the district has not yet announced the model it plans to use when school begins. Portland Public Schools: One of three possible scenarios will be chosen in August for portland public school students. The district plans to eventually return to face-to-face instruction, but there is no set date yet. Gov. Asa Hutchinson has repeatedly said that face-to-face instruction should be resumed in the fall, but schools need to be ready with a virtual curriculum as well. Bangor School Department: Students are expected to resume face-to-face instructions in the fall. After President Trump announced plans to cut funding for schools they don't resume face-to-face instruction, Governor Larry Hogan said Maryland won't take any bullying, and the state will make the best decisions we can based on science and what educators and health officials say. Montgomery County Public Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Prince George's County Public Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Baltimore County Public Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but a draft of a reopening plan will be submitted to the Board of School Commissioners on July 28. On June 25, Jeffery Riley, commissioner of elementary and high school in Massachusetts, released guidelines for schools planning to reopen. The guidelines are primarily intended to help schools prepare for face-to-face learning, but DESE is requiring schools to plan hybrid and remote learning as well. Boston Public Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Springfield Public Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but the district said it will create face-to-face, remote and hybrid learning models for students. Worcester Public Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Teachers' Union leader: We won't risk the lives of children or teachers July 9, 2020:6:18 On July 8, Governor Gretchen Whitmer said she is concerned about the reopening of schools during the pandemic and will not send the children back unless it is safe. Whitmer had already released a series of guidelines on June 30 that outline the minimum health and safety requirements needed for reopening. Detroit Public Schools Community District: Students can choose face-to-face instruction or virtual instruction. Utica Community Schools: Students will start the school year with face-to-face instruction, completely virtual instruction, or a mixed model of the two. Dearborn Public Schools: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. The Minnesota Department of Health has released

guidelines for schools that encourage them to prepare face-to-face, virtual, and hybrid plans for reopening. Governor Tim Walz will announce the model that schools should use during the week of July 27. Anoka-Hennepin School District: No official plans have been announced for the start of the 2020-2021 school year, but the district is expected to announce whether it plans to use a face-to-face, virtual, or hybrid model by the week of July 27.St. : No official plans have been released for the 2020-2021 school year, but students must resume classes on September 8 or 10 in face-to-face, virtual or hybrid format. Minneapolis Public Schools: No official plans were released for the 2020-2021 school year. The district is awaiting further guidance from the state. At a meeting on July 8, Governor Tate Reeves said he is committed to opening schools safely this fall. DeSoto County School District: The must resume face-to-face classes on August 6, but parents can also choose to enroll their children in online instruction. Jackson Public School District: No official plan has been announced for the next school year, but Superintendent Errick Greene said the final plan will be released before July 17. Rankin County School District: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but they must be released before July 17. Schools must prioritize tests and masks to safely reopen, says the doctor July 9, 202003:51On July 9, 20003, Governor Mike Parson, the Missouri Department of Elementary and High School and the Department of Health and Senior Services have released guidelines for school reopenings throughout the state. Guidelines include recommendations for screening, social distancing, and facial coverage. Springfield Public School District: Students are scheduled to start school on August 24, but no official plan has been released detailing how it will be. The district is expected to announce its reopening strategy in late July.St. Louis Public Schools: No plans were announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Rockwood School District: Students can choose to take classes in person or online. A more detailed plan will be released in July 20.Gov. Steve Bullock announced that reopenings for school districts will have three phases. His plan says schools can reopen to face-to-face education, but it depends on the circumstances of a particular community. Billings Elementary School District: Montana's largest district is reopening according to Superintendent Greg Upham, although face-to-face instruction plans have not yet been disclosed. Great Falls Elementary School District: Great Falls has not issued an official statement about its plans to reopen in the fall. Missoula County Public Schools: The district has announced its intentions to reopen schools for face-to-face education for the 2020-2021 school yearThe Nebraska Department of Education has a Nebraska launch site that will provide guidance on districts returning to face-to-face instruction. Omaha Public Schools: On June 26, the district unveiled a plan to divide students into two groups, with each attending face-to-face school for half a week. Lincoln Public Schools: Lincoln Public School said it has plans for students to return in the fall, but could reduce the number of students attending face-to-face instruction to maintain social distancing practices. Millard Public Schools: Superintendent Jim Sufin said the district plans to open buildings for the fall on Monday, August 10, he wrote in a letter. Gov. Steve Sisolak signed a directive on June 7 allowing Nevada schools to open up buildings and athletic facilities. Clark County School District: The district is still in the deliberation phase. Currently, the district is proposing a hybrid model consisting of two face-to-face days and three days of remote learning. Washoe County School District: The Board of Directors district approved a plan to return to school by 2020 if COVID-19 levels remain low and if the Nevada State Board of Education approves the reopening plan. Half-Half and high schools intend to operate with 50% capacity with students attending face-to-face instruction during half the week. Elko County School District: A reopening task force formed in early June, but a decision was not made. The district is researching families on the reopening of schools and remote learning challenges along with the parameters. Health Gov. Chris Sununu said he hopes to have a definitive answer on the issue of reopening schools by mid-July. A reopening proposal is pending approval from the state epidemiologist. Manchester School District: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. Nashua School District: Nashua is ready for a hybrid model and is in the process of putting Chromebooks in the hands of each student. Concord School District: A Concord task force is still in the discussion phase, but members are considering a hybrid model for the fall. Gov. Phil Murphy and Department of Education Commissioner Lamont Repollet launched The Road Return and Recovery Plan for Education on June 26. The report stated that public schools will open for face-to-face teaching in some capacity at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year. It also describes that schools should allow social distancing and require facial coverage in their district proposals. Newark Public School District: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year. East Orange School District: On its website, East Orange has its first full day of school scheduled for September 8, but has not yet released a comprehensive return plan. Irvington Public Schools School District: No official plans were announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but the district issued a survey for parents and teachers. Before July 4, Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham said that if the state takes the necessary precautions and reduces the rate of COVID-19 cases, schools could reopen in the fall. A date for reopening has not yet been issued. Albuquerque Public Schools: With their school year typically starting August 12, Acting Superintendent Scott Elder said they will have a plan by August 1. The district hasn't revealed any proposals yet. Las Cruces Public Schools: Along with a Re-entry Task Force, Superintendent Dr. Dr. As a preventive measure, the district is asking parents to immunize their children before August 12. Rancho River Public Schools: Rio Rancho has not yet released its plans for the fall. Gov. Andrew Cuomo announced on August 7 that all schools in the state have the option to reopen with at least some face-to-face instruction in the fall. Even if schools reopen, Cuomo said in July that ultimately it's up to parents to decide whether to send their children back. New York City Public Schools: The New York City Department of Education said that have the option to choose between remote and hybrid learning models for the next school Public Schools: No concrete plans were announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but the district has released a draft of plans that cover face-to-face, hybrid, and remote learning options. Rochester City School District: No concrete plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year, but they will be through August 21. New York City schools will reopen only part-time in the fall, the mayor said on July 9, 20202:11Gov. Roy Cooper warned on June 9 that as COVID-19 cases increase in the state, public school places could be postponed from the state's initial school start times in August. Wake County Schools: The School Board of the Wake County Public Schools System voted to initiate the state's Plan B option for the school's reopening. The plan involves dividing the district's student body into three rotating groups similar to hybrid models from other states. Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools: The district has several plans to reopen for when autumn instruction resumes. They have strategies for a complete reopening, a partial reopening and a fully remote model. Guilford County Schools: On Tuesday, June 7, the district approved two plans for learning. Virtual Gov. Doug Burgum expressed his support for the reopening of schools. If they open school buildings, he said, testing will be a big factor. The governor and the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction plan to release state guidelines in mid-July. Bismarck School District #1: The district intends to move forward with the reopening. In a survey conducted for families, 87% supported the plan. Fargo Public Schools: This fall, Fargo Public Schools will give students the option to continue distance learning online or attend face-to-face classes as long as Burgum allows online instruction. West Fargo Public Schools: The district has made no known official plans, but on its website, it states that the school is prepared for what comes to us in the 2020-21 school year. In a press release, Governor Mike DeWine issued guidelines for schools to reopen. The Ohio Department of Education has created a plan that includes considerations about wearing masks and applying safety precautions. Each district will make its own decision. Columbus City School District: On June 30, the district announced that high school students will continue to learn remotely full-time, while pre-kindergarten to eighth graders will go to school three days a week and do two days of online learning. Cleveland Municipal School District: No formal statement has yet been made about the district's decision. Cincinnati City School District: On its website, the district outlined a comprehensive plan to return to school in the fall. Includes a learning model mixed with face-to-face classes during three days a week. The option remains so that students continue learning remotely. The Oklahoma State Department of Education has published Return to Learn Oklahoma: A Framework for Reopening Schools that includes many proposals for districts can safely return to face-to-face instruction. Oklahoma City Public Schools: The district is preparing to return to face-to-face education, with a virtual option for parents who don't feel comfortable sending their children back to school. Tulsa Public Schools: The Tulsa Board of Education has released its school calendar beginning August 31 for face-to-face classes. They also outlined distance learning days on Wednesdays, which means students can participate in distance learning, but children who require additional tutoring can enter school. Edmond Public Schools: The district is ready to return to face-to-face learning on August 13, with the prediction that they may need to close schools if an outbreak arises. As a contingency plan, the district has a hybrid and completely remote model. Last week, Governor Kate Brown extended the state of emergency over the COVID-19 pandemic for another 60 days. June 7 marked the first meeting of the Brown Healthy Schools Reopening Council, which will work to decide on school places. Portland Public Schools: The PPS awaits guidance from the Oregon Department of Education.Salem-Keizer School District: According to its website, the district is working to finalize details for the 2020-21 school year. Beaverton School District: Beaverton is offering parents two options: students can make a hybrid model with face-to-face learning in smaller groups alternating with remote learning, or they can enroll in a fully online education program. Gov. Tom Wolf announced that for districts that decide to return to the classroom, the use of masks is mandatory unless there is room for physical distancing. Philadelphia City School District: Superintendent William Hite Jr. said that in mid-July, the district will finalize its plan for face-to-face classes. He added that not all students are likely to return. Pittsburgh Public Schools: The district has not yet unveiled a final plan, but Superintendent Anthony Hamlet said there will be a full-time online learning component. There is also potential for a hybrid model. Central Bucks School District: The district has issued a survey on the return to face-to-face instruction, but the final plan is likely to be determined at the July 28 board meeting. Superintendent John Kopicki said the Central Bucks plans to give an option. A face-to-face, remote gov. Gina Raimondo issued a back-to-school document with ri's Department of Education and the Department of Health. The goal is to achieve 100% face-to-face instruction, with health and safety guidelines of COVID-19. Providence Public Schools: Superintendent Harrison Peters is weighing three alternatives to return to school. The first option would be for students to arrive at four start times to your normal school. The second option would have K-5 students attending the school closest to home, while the 6th to 8th grade attends the current school. Option three would have all students attending the public schools closest to The Desarnes Public School: Cranston Cranston School issued four proposals for the 2020-21 school year, ranging from full classroom classes to full distance learning. Warwick Public Schools: The Warwick District has not yet made any public decision on the reopening, but will have to submit a fall plan by July 17.As schools abroad are dealing with the coronavirus crisis July 10, 202002:45 On July 8, a South Carolina Senate subcommittee met to deliberate the opening of schools in the fall. Members discussed the potential for virtual and face-to-face classes. Most districts haven't made a decision yet. Greenville County School District: No decision has been made, but athletics cannot resume training with high local rates of COVID-19 cases. Charleston County School District: The district hopes to return to face-to-face instruction in the fall, but is offering a full-time virtual learning program. Horry County Schools: On July 9, HCS President Ken Richardson said he will ask the school board to postpone the start of school until September 8, and that his final plans to return to school will not be issued until July 27.Gov. Kristi Noem said students will return in the fall, but is leaving the details for each district. Sioux Falls School District: District officials announced that they plan for students to return in person on the August 27 commencing date, but their precautionary measures remain largely unknown to the public. The district said it will strongly recommend facial coverage, but will not require them in the fall. Rapid City Area School District: A mixed learning model is in the works for the district where parents can determine whether students will attend face-to-face classes. Harrisburg School District: No information about the school district's decision for the fall was disclosed to the public. Gov. Bill Lee recently extended a state of emergency until August 29. Even so, he hopes students can safely return to face-to-face classes. Shelby County Schools: The Shelby County school district released a detailed plan for the fall 2020-21 school year on July 6. Parents have until July 18 to determine whether they want to send their children to school or have them enrolled in an online option. Both are scheduled to begin on August 13. Metro Nashville Public Schools: Scheduled to open on August 4, the district announced its decision to start the year in a virtual environment by Labor Day, at which time it will reevaluate. Knoxville County Schools: Students are ready to return to school next month, but decisions have not yet been finalized on what precautions the district will take to return to school buildings. June 18 marked the decision to reopen public schools for face-to-face instruction by My Governor Greg Abbott. A spokesperson for the Texas Education Agency that students will be required to wear masks or be subject to COVID-19 tests when they return in the fall. Houston Independent School District: Parents and students in this district will have to wait for July 15, when plans to reveal new details about the school should be released. Dallas Independent School District: The school district announced on Twitter and on the website that the Board of Trustees will meet in late July to discuss an alternative start date for the 2020-21 school year. In fact, earlier, Superintendent Michale Hinojosa said an August opening is virtually in jeopardy. Cypress-Fairbanks Independent School District: While it still needs to finalize plans for the school year, the district is likely to have face-to-face learning and instruction. Virtual Gov. Gary Herbert ordered on July 9 that all K-12 schools in the state should require facial coverage. However, he did not extend this mandate to everyone in Utah. Last week, he approved the Board of Education's plan to reopen schools in the fall. Alpine School District: Plans for face-to-face classes to begin on August 18, as well as online options were announced on July 6. Davis School District: The district recently outlined its intentions to return to face-to-face instruction with a plan known as the Big Five. The name refers to the five main safety precautions: hygiene label, staying at home when sick, cloth face masks, physical distancing, cleaning and disinfectant. Granite School District: Before Governor Herbert's July 9 term, the district required masks for employees, but only strongly encouraged them for students. Further plans will be made in the coming weeks. Last month, Vermont officials and Governor Phil Scott approved K-12 schools to reopen in the fall. As part of the initiative, students and staff will be subject to daily temperature checks and districts need to have alternatives at the event that schools need to close. Champlain Valley School District: The district has not yet released its reopening plan in the fall. Burlington School District: New Burlington School District Superintendent Tom Flanagan outlined a 100-day plan for the district's reopening scheduled for August 26. Among the comprehensive plans, the task force said students will not have lunch in the cafeteria and will need to wear masks and undergo temperature tests. South Burlington School District: The district has not released its plan, but will likely include mandatory facial coverage, temperature checks and a reduction in students in a given classroom. The Virginia Department of Education, along with Governor Ralph Northam, issued guidelines in June for a relaxed opening of schools with due social distancing and safety precautions. Currently, the plan is a model combined with virtual and physical learning, although the goal is to hold face-to-face classes for everyone. Fairfax County Public Schools: The county school board postponed the start of fall instruction by two weeks from August 25 to September 8. The is that in doing so, the council has more time to plan for the safest return for face-to-face classes. Prince William County Public Schools: The district outlined four plans and said some form of remote learning is guaranteed. O O range from a completely remote experience to a return to normality, although with social distancing practices in place. Loudoun County Public Schools: Like Fairfax County public schools, LCPS announced on July 8 that it would submit its return to discussion on the school method for July 15 at 8 a.m. The options are currently 100% virtual learning or a hybrid model similar to many other districts. Without a definitive verdict on schools opening one way or another, Governor Jay Inslee said the decision will be made by Washington state, not the White House. Inslee said he hopes schools can return to face-to-face instruction, but only if it can be done safely. Seattle Public Schools: The district's school board has unveiled a 50-page reopening plan that primarily discusses the possibility of a hybrid model, blending remote and physical learning. Spokane School District: District council members expect students to return to classrooms on September 3, but are presenting several plans for parents who feel uncomfortable with the notion of their children returning to school. Lake Washington School District: According to the district's Twitter page, LWSU is strongly considering a hybrid model that would combine classroom class time with virtual distance learning time. Under this method, all kindergarten and first grade students attended school daily. During a press conference, Governor Jim Justice said he hopes to reopen school buildings in all 55 counties for face-to-face instruction by the provisional date of September 8. As part of this, anyone over 9 years should wear a facial covering. Kanawha County Schools: The district has released a survey to measure parents' interest and concern about classroom learning. Based on the results of the survey, the board will finalize a decision. Berkeley County Schools: The Board of Education will meet on July 13 to discuss plans for the 2020-21 school year. So far, no formal plan has been drawn up yet. Cabell County Schools: The district is working on a plan that would see students return to a five-day face-to-face school week; however, they have a hybrid backup model. Final decisions will not be made until mid-July.Gov. Tony Evers left the decision to reopen schools for each district. However, he added at a July 7 press conference, he believes face-to-face class time is preferable.Milwaukee School District: The district is weighing numerous options. If the virtual classes remained, the district assured parents that each student would be equipped with the appropriate technology. Madison Metropolitan School District: The district has only one preliminary plan for schools in the fall. An MMSD press release outlined three options: a fully remote learning environment, all face-to-face learning, and a hybrid model. Kenosha School District: KSD began deliberations on June 19, and so far nothing has been announced. Under the guidance of Governor Mark Gordon, the COVID-19 Education Task Force launched its Smart Start to put students back in the classroom. School districts must submit their own smart start plans to the Department of Education by August 3. Laramie County School District #1: The district has announced that it expects to start school as normal—or as normal as possible, Superintendent Boyd Brown said. The district will also implement a remote option. Natrona County School District #1: No official plans have been announced for the 2020-2021 school year.
